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Make An Egyptian Papyrus Scroll! Classroom Activity

Make an ancient Egyptian papyrus scroll from paper bags using the steps below.

Things you'll need:

- 2 Brown paper bags
- Wide, shallow bowl
- 1/4 measuring cup
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/4 cup white glue
- Wax paper

Instructions

- 1. Tear one brown paper bag into strips that measure around 10 inches long and 1 inch wide
- 2. Fill you shallow bowl with 1/4 cup of water and 1/4 cup of white glue. Mix to combine.
- 3. Cover a flat surface with a sheet of waxed paper. (your finished papyrus will be this size)
- 4. Dunk a strip of paper bag completely into the water/glue mixture. Lift it out and run it between your finger and thumb to get rid of excess. Lay it along one edge of the wax paper.
- 5. Repeat with a second strip of paper bag. Lay it slightly overlapping the first one.
- 6. Continue until your sheet of waxed paper is covered.
- 7. Now tear your second bag into strips. Repeat the process, but lay these strips crosswise across the first set of strips.
- 8. Press down on the strips to smooth. Allow to dry.
- 9. When dry, you can draw or write on your papyrus, roll it into a scroll, and tie it with a ribbon or string.
